

PALM SUNDAY OF LENT, YEAR A - 24 MARCH 2024

Oh Lord, do not leave me alone, my strength, make haste to help me

E HAVE JOURNEYED with Christ through Lent, from the silence of the wilderness, to the dawning realisation that his whole life has been a preparation for the events that will unfold on Good Friday.

This Sunday, we see the contrast of Jesus's joyful yet humble procession into Jerusalem. We witness how the same crowd turn against his message of love and compassion and now call for his death. (*Gospel*)

The *First Reading* from Isaiah is a prophecy of the suffering servant. It tells of the willingness with which Jesus enters into his Passion, confident that the Lord will give him strength.

The *Psalm* continues to describe the insults and humiliation that Jesus took upon himself in order to set us free from sin. The response draws on the words that Jesus cried out as his earthly life drew to a close.

In the *Second Reading*, St Paul reveals the hidden truth of Christ. Jesus embraced the frailty and mortality of humanity, so that we could be drawn into the circle of the Trinity, and acclaim with the whole of creation that Jesus Christ is Lord of all.

Let us pray for each other as we enter into this Holy Week, that we will each make time to sit in silence with Jesus.

Let us be willing to journey with Jesus through his Passion, death and Resurrection.

HOLY WEEK

We may choose to be with him when he is anointed with oil in Bethany, as he eats the Passover meal with his friends, as he prays in earnest in Gethsemane, and during his arrest and betrayal; or we may walk alongside him as he carries the cross, and then stand with him at its foot as he gives up his spirit.

THE CATECHISM CONNECTION - Palm Sunday

Here, some paragraphs from **the Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC)** are presented because they cite, or allude to, or treat topics found in the liturgical readings. We, therefore, encourage you to read them with the Catechism that we may grow deeper in our understanding of our Faith.

CCC 607:

HE DESIRE TO embrace his Father's plan of redeeming love inspired Jesus' whole life,⁴¹⁸ for his redemptive passion was the very reason for his Incarnation. And so he asked, "And what shall I say? 'Father, save me from this hour'? No, for this purpose I have come to this hour."⁴¹⁹ And again, "Shall I not drink the cup which the Father has given me?"⁴²⁰ From the cross, just before "It is finished", he said, "I thirst."⁴²¹

PALM SUNDAY

Palm Sunday is the beginning of Holy Week, and commemorates the triumphant arrival of Christ in Jerusalem, days before he was crucified. In the Gospels, Jesus entered Jerusalem riding a young donkey, and to the lavish praise of the townspeople who threw clothes, or possibly palms or small branches, in front of him as a sign of homage.

HOLY THURSDAY

Holy Thursday is about:

- commemoration of the Last Supper, with Jesus saying: This is my body ... this is my blood ...



- He also establishes the special priesthood for his disciples, which is distinct from the "priesthood of all believers." Christ

washed the feet of his Disciples, who would become the first priests.



GOOD FRIDAY

"'It is finished'; and he bowed his head and handed over his spirit." On Good Friday, the entire Church fixes her gaze on the Cross at Calvary. Each member of the Church tries to understand at what cost Christ has won our redemption.

The Church - stripped of its ornaments, the altar bare, and with the door of

the empty tabernacle standing open are signs of mourning. The omission of the prayer of consecration deepens our sense of loss because Mass throughout the year reminds us of the Lord's triumph over death, the source of our joy and blessing. The desolate quality of the rites of this day reminds us of Christ's humiliation and suffering during his Passion.

HOLY SATURDAY (EASTER VIGIL)

symbolises Christ, the Light of the World.

The Easter Vigil liturgy is the most beautiful liturgy in the Roman Catholic Church. The vigil is divided into four parts:1) Service of Light - A new fire is lit and blessed. The Paschal candle

2) Liturgy of the Word - Nine readings are provided: seven from the Old testament and two from the New Testament. Not all are required

to be read. These readings help us to meditate on the wonderful works of God for his people since the beginning of time.

 Liturgy of Baptism - New members are brought into the Church through baptism, part of the liturgy includes the Litany of the Saints.

4) Liturgy of Eucharist - The whole church is called to join at the sacrificial table that Christ prepared for us through his death and resurrection. The Lord is risen, alleluia, alleluia!
